



All Village Agricultural Committees (VACs) are successfully managing community-based agricultural infrastructure, namely, rice mills and water pumps for irrigation of rice fields, ensuring supply of fuel (for operating rice mills and pumps), maintenance, and repairs.

VACs maintained a schedule to irrigate farmers' fields, which was especially important during the extreme heat of the drought, and managed to keep 100% of farmers' fields alive, at a time when many other rice fields in the region were devastated, and were able to help additional farmers in the village who were not part of this project. Moreover, 100% of 27 VACs are actively linking farmers to markets. VAC members are visiting markets and communicating with buyers (middlemen) on a regular basis to find the best selling price for rice and pigs, marketing the availability of organically grown rice in their village, negotiating higher prices on behalf of farmers, and advising farmers on best times to sell for higher profit.

Encouraging anecdotal evidence from VACs and project staff, there is extremely strong demand for farmer's rice, and farmers are fetching a premium price for their sales, because it is organic. In many cases, buyers (middlemen) have pre-ordered rice from farmers with a deposit and a favourable per-tonne price for farmers even before it is harvested.

Climate change has been a significant factor affecting project activities. The province of Pursat has suffered a severe drought described by the local government as the worst since 1979. According to the Department of Agriculture, more than 49,000 hectares of rice fields in the region were affected by excessive heat in the dry season followed by scarce rain in the usual wet season. Yields diminished across the region and many rice fields were devastated completely. Despite these severe climatic conditions, farmers within this project sustained remarkable success, even making small gains in average yield in both dry and wet season rice This success can be attributed to proper management by VACs to organise additional water pumping into farmers' fields, and use of dry season rice seed varieties and natural fertiliser, allowed rice plants to mature more quickly with less water. Farmers also learned techniques to preserve soil humidity for vegetable crops, and were able to maintain and improve harvests. Farmers commented that they were initially discouraged about raising pigs, as it is not uncommon for pigs and piglets to die during the dry season due to the extreme heat. However, with training on proper livestock care and management, all of the pigs provided to farmers survived even the extreme drought conditions of this year's dry season. This project therefore had significant impact in helping farmers adapt successfully to environmental factors.

This project has a further two years to run and your support will increase its chance of success.
